- Type of pet




Prepare a Disaster Response Plan

Evacuation Order is Issued

- Animal behaviors can change
- Bring pets inside
- Attach identification (microchips encouraged)
- Individual carriers for each pet
- Implement evacuation plan



After the Disaster

- Survey your environment for dangers (Broken glass, etc.)
- Release pets inside to adapt
- Slowly increase food if they have been without
- Contact Animal Control and shelters daily if pets were lost
- Post waterproof lost animal notices
